

Keep track of your studies. Do so in any way you wish, but do it. You'll be glad.


3) Return to the test-question data banks and see what jewels you can find.

Natural Resources are Distributed Unevenly Across the Globe:



I learned that there was one international test we could both take, called PISA. Maybe they do better on questions about that and I do better on questions about building (if they don't have builders in their family (except us, hahaha!).

On PiSA, I first saw this part called <u>You, Your Family and Your Home</u>, on this <u>Student Common Part Questionnaire in English</u>. (I didn't see it in Portuguese or Spanish.)

I found out PISA wanted to know a lot about what we all thought about science, and if we thought about what should happen in science to save the future, it seems to me. It is a really long and pretty interesting survey that they don't grade you on. We could all do it there and here, and see what we were learning more of and in what ways.
