Each discipline has a canon. Each canon is comprised of that which is consistently observed, analyzed, categorized, classified, defined, known, as well as that which is consistently known as most excellent, powerful, compelling of that which is ineffable. Actors claiming status within these disciplines are responsible for knowing this canon, while, at the same time, testing its veracity, extending its limits, and blasting through its boundaries and charting its overlaps with other disciplines as new thought occurs, new forms of expression are created, new means of study are developed, new findings are made, and for – in so far as their temperament allows – proffering their creations and discoveries to other scholars and the public for consideration, response, and critique
