Below, I show questions that might be a little more relevant to Annie if she took the PARCC.<sup>1 2</sup> Do note, however, that she was cabin-schooled for her early formal education (which consisted mostly of reading the bible, according to her), and then, when on land, "finishing school."

PARRC tests are intended to help students be more "college and career ready." It purportedly looks at whether students can solve problems, not just prepare for tests by memorization.

PARCC Tests are based on the Common Core. According to MA officials (see document link),"innovative items" from which it will be will be incorporated in to <u>MCAS/PARCC</u> <u>hybrid (now still being called MCAS as of fall 2017)</u>.

PARCC tests English Language Arts/Literacy, and includes much more literary analysis, informational text (non-fiction), research simulation, narrative writing...

One of the debates about the newer standardized tests in ELA is that they shift the emphasis on Literary Analysis and writing to non-fiction analysis, thus perhaps undertesting items in the curriculum teachers find vital to well-educated graduates, and build into the curriculum which need not be removed in favor of room to gain competence in the formerly less emphasized areas. **Consider the third grade research simulation in this context.** 

\* The Research Simulation Task requires students to analyze an informational topic through several articles or multimedia stimuli. Students read and respond to a series of questions and synthesize information from multiple sources in order to write an analytic essay. In the early years, "research simulation" refers to work done on provided texts and presented online. In later years the research is done on the internet and incorporated onto the PARCC." [reference: check document - I may have written this, as I did the para above.
